Mid-Maine Chamber and the Central Maine Growth Council have partnered to form a nonprofit extension, thereby allowing them to grant-write in order to further their own missions. Named the Central Maine Community Betterment Collaborative (CMCBC), it is organized exclusively



for charitable, religious, educational, and scientific purposes under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or corresponding section of any future federal tax code. Its mission is to support, address, educate, coordinate, and improve the mid-Maine region's overall public health and socioeconomic landscape. CMCBC supports this work in mid-Maine by focusing on improving the well-being of people, the built environment, and critical ecosystems (including workforce development, attraction and retention initiatives, and initiatives to increase employment opportunities) while fostering relationships that strive for community resilience.

Now, those wishing to make a donation to the Chamber's Joseph B. Ezhaya Scholarship can make their payment to CMCBC and receive a tax deductible receipt. Most importantly, this new nonprofit can also be used by area businesses to provide scholarships for a nominal fee. Additionally, those nonprofits that may have let their status lapse, or who are not a c3, maybe be able to work with CMCBC to run their grant application under the Collaborative, provided that it fits the above mission criteria.

This year's Festival of Trees, held at the Waterville Elks Banquet Center on Nov. 17-19, and 24-26, 2023, will be hosted by the Betterment Collaborative, but will still be a collaboration with the Alfond Youth & Community Center with both organizations splitting the proceeds. 

In recognition of Suicide Awareness Month, Mid-Maine Chamber's young professionals group, KV Connect, hosted a free-and-open-to-the-public forum on Friday, Sept. 21 in its boardroom with approximately 20 area nonprofit, business, and educational professionals in attendance.

## **Member News**

**Staples®** reminds you that you can deliver your Amazon returns to its location on Waterville Commons Drive.

According to **MaineBiz**, transportation services in 4 rural ME counties are getting a boost from \$650,462 in federal dollars. The money is being allocated through the MDOT to 2 nonprofit orgs., Penquis and Kennebec Valley Community Action Program, to expand ride services for residents in Penobscot, Piscataquis, Somerset and Kennebec counties. These orgs. will use the funds to upgrade technology, increasing efficiency through the use of real-time data and enhanced scheduling and dispatching. A fare card system will also expand payment options for riders. Last yr., Penquis and KVCAP made transportation available for nearly 8k Mainers in need, providing 454,766 rides that covered 8.6M miles.

WinterKids has announced the recipients of its Downhill 24 Outdoor Fund 2nd-yr. grants, totaling \$51k, to 12 orgs. across ME. These grants are aimed at promoting outdoor activities and encouraging children to stay active throughout the yr. Maine 501 Nonprofits Category awarded \$10k to **Pine Tree Camp** and in the ME Parks & Rec. Honorable Mention Category, **Quarry Road Trails** will receive \$500.

The Institute for Family-Owned Business released the names of finalists recently, with plans to announce the winners at an Oct. 18 event. Hosting the awards this year is Amanda Hill, news anchor for WCSH, also known as **NEWSCENTER Maine**. Out of 500 ME cos. nominated for this year's family business awards, 26 finalists are in the running for the annual contest. Of those, **Holy Cannoli** has made the cut!

**Cianbro** has won a \$112.76M National Park Service contract to rebuild a portion of the National Mall Tidal Basin in D.C. It will rehab 6,800 ft of failing seawalls around the basin, along the Potomac River through W. Potomac Park. The Great American Outdoors Act National Parks and Public Land Legacy Restoration Fund is funding it.

**Aubuchon Hardware** raised over 343k to donate to over 100 regional charities. The Aubuchon Company and its employees are committed to giving time, talent and resources to make the company and the community a better place. This spring, it raised money (through in-store round-up campaigns). Additionally, the amount contributed was then matched up to \$2,500 per charity by the Aubuchon Foundation.

Maine International Trade Center will receive \$350k in fed. money to boost ME sm. biz. exports. The funding will support activities such as participating in foreign trade missions & export trade show exhibits, market sales trips, international marketing campaigns, and attending training workshops. The money comes from the **U.S. Small Business Administration's** State Trade Expansion Program and is part of a \$20M tranche of grants awarded to 49 state and territory international trade agencies. Since 2020, over 60 sm. bizes in ME have received financial assistance to support their international

exporting, resulting in \$6.9M in actual sales and an additional \$76.3M expected in the next 12 --18 mos. The figures represent a 13:1 immediate ROI and a projected 143:1 future return on grant funds, according to the SBA.

Recently, **United Way of Kennebec Valley (UWKV)** launched its '23 fundraising season with \$1,103,723 in committed early support at the Campaign Kickoff Breakfast — an increase of more than \$100k from last yr.'s event. 18 businesses reported early campaign success to a crowd of more than 250 people at the breakfast. Last year, 1 in 4 Kennebec County residents received direct support from one of 58 funded UWKV programs -- a net increase of 9 programs over last yr. — with requests for funding exceeding available dollars by \$400k. This data highlights the significant increase in need for services that has been impacting not only Kennebec County, but many nonprofits across the state.

The Philip C. Hastings Award, presented by efficiency Maine, for significant contributions to energy efficiency and to the state's environmental stewardship through exemplarily support of the efficiency Maine program, was presented recently to the **Industrial Energy Consumers Group** in recognition of the over 375 efficiency projects and millions of dollars invested in reduction energy use as well as carbon output. ## Chamber committee opposes Question 3

Mid-Maine Chamber's Public Policy committee and Board of Directors' has taken the position to oppose Question 3 on your Nov. 7th ballot joining Gov. Mills, former Gov. LePage, IBEW and AFL-CIO in their opposition. We arrived at the decision after lots of discussion and for several reasons. First and foremost, if the government can take over our power companies, what is to prevent it from taking over your broadband provider, natural gas supplier, or cable service? Do we really want the government to take over private businesses? Where does it stop? In the same way that we are opposed to this now, we would be opposed to a government takeover of your business. I could stop here and declare that this why we are opposed, but there's more to dislike in this bill. Do we want elected officials - and some "experts" hired by these elected officials - running our electric delivery system?

Additionally, the math that claims a savings supporting government power just doesn't work. A public power company would need to hire an organization to run it adding an additional layer of bureaucratic expense, and that organization could be CMP and Versant again – there is nothing in the current legislation preventing that from occurring if it passes. Also not included in the legislation is any verbiage guaranteeing that the state would get to carbon neutrality any more quickly than we are now.

And finally, it's the sheer expense of it. From what I've read and heard, estimates place the expense between \$7 and \$13.5 BILLION dollars, which would be borrowed by the state of Maine against future income from ratepayers. Money would be borrowed at a lower interest rate since this would be a government entity, but ratepayers would be on the hook for the debt. Even if the state could borrow at zero interest rate, that's a lot of money to have to pay back!

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

## Member Spotlight: Waterville Area Soup Kitchen - The Lighthouse



Once upon a time in a bustling city, there lived a middle-aged man named David, who had fallen on hard times, and his oncethriving career had crumbled, leaving him unemployed and struggling to make ends meet. Every day was a struggle, and he often went to bed hungry.

One chilly autumn morning, David heard about a place called "The Lighthouse," a humble soup kitchen renowned for serving warm meals to those in need. With a

glimmer of hope in his heart, he decided to visit. The moment he stepped inside, he was enveloped by the comforting aroma of homemade soup and the welcoming smiles of the volunteers.

David's first meal at The Lighthouse was a simple bowl of chicken vegetable soup, accompanied by salad and a piece of bread. As he savored each spoonful, a wave of warmth washed over him, not just from the soup but from the kindness and compassion that surrounded him. The staff and volunteers treated him with dignity, making him feel like a valued guest rather than someone in need.

This one meal a day at The Lighthouse became a lifeline for David. It

wasn't just nourishment for his body; it was nourishment for his soul. It gave him hope, a sense of belonging, and a daily reminder that even in his darkest days, there were people who cared.

As weeks turned into months, David's life began to change. The routine of coming to The Lighthouse introduced structure into his day, and the support he received extended beyond the meal. The staff helped him connect with social services, and he eventually found a job opportunity that he had never expected.

With newfound confidence and determination, David managed to get back on his feet. He no longer relied solely on The Lighthouse for meals, but he continued to visit, not as a guest in need, but as a volunteer, eager to give back and be a source of hope for others just as he had once been.

"The Lighthouse" had not just filled David's belly; it had illuminated his path out of darkness. It taught him the power of compassion, and how one simple act of kindness — a warm meal — could make all the difference in someone's life. And so, the story of David and The Lighthouse became a testament to the enduring impact of kindness and the resilience of the human spirit.




